along around the Christmas tree and remember the true meaning of Christmas.

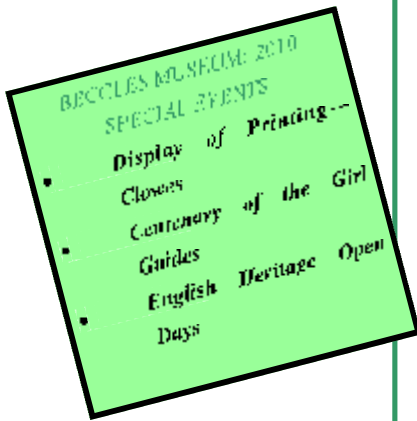

The Museum had a good start from Easter through to September showing increases in visitors from 2008. This was helped through the Barsham and East Suffolk Rail-

way Exhibitions. Planned special events were very successful, such as the Waveney Revels on Easter Monday when Queen Elizabeth I arrived on horseback, and the English Heritage Open Day tours of Lemman House, led by Ian Hinton. Other successful events, organized by Pam Finch, were the Victorian Clothes Show on Tuesdays and Thursdays during September and the Museum is now part of the History and Ghost Walks. You might also have seen a Duck on the premises as part of the Beccles Duck Trail! The Railwayman's Weekend in June proved very popular and the Museum gained

valuable archive material. The Sir John Leman portrait and retinue is proving a valuable asset to the Museum. Members recently visited Hampton Court to see an earlier version of his portrait painted by the same artist Levinus de Vogelaare in 1616.

John Brodribb has moved to new pastures and so Pam Finch is taking over as Curator with **Jenny Willer** as her assistant. Waveney Stardust II is currently sitting ~~ashore~~ in a 'boat bag', rather like a butterfly in a chrysalis, waiting to burst forth into life! Our second cruiser has had works below decks almost completed and the new hydraulic lift is complete and painted to the same standards as the rest of the cruiser. The interior fitting-out stage is

waiting for us to achieve the target sum set in August of £70,000. The amount has already been reduced to £40,000 with many grants and donations having been gratefully received. THANK YOU.

Unfortunately, everything has to be paid for and the longer the hull has to stay unfinished, the more it will

cost! The present financial situation in general means we are amassing less interest on credited sums.

As soon as the target sum has been reached, the boatyard can start work on the fitting-out. The cruiser is at the ~~stage where to do a bit here and there~~ is more costly than completion in one go!

A SENSE OF HISTORY

Appropriately enough for a town that keenly values its heritage the Beccles & District Historical Society is one of the most enduringly successful of local societies. It was founded in 1927 at a time when there was great concern, nationally, at the neglect of ancient buildings and records in danger of being lost forever. The Society was vigorous in raising awareness locally of the problem, and its work played a significant part in the subsequent establishment of Beccles Museum and the Beccles Society and close links with these are still maintained.

Nowadays the main activities

of the Historical Society centre around a year-round programme of talks and excursions. During the winter season the congenial surroundings of Hungate Church are regularly filled each month for illustrated talks by visiting experts, whose subjects cover a broad spectrum of history but with a special interest in our own area. This year's programme includes talks on East Anglian landed estates; on the problems of our coastline; on Suffolk painters; and on 17th Century witches we were relieved to learn that none were traced to Beccles!

During the Summer the Society organizes monthly excursions, ringing the changes between the stately homes, castles, churches and museums in which our area is so rich and enjoying our countryside, sometimes on the water or by narrow-gauge railway. This year's visits have included Thetford Priory, Woodbridge Tide Mill, Landguard Fort and The Museum of the Broads. In recent years we have undertaken longer expeditions and in 2010 we are planning to visit Chatsworth House and Haddon Hall. The opportunity to meet like-minded friends makes the Historical Society such an important and congenial part of life in Beccles for so many people.

BECCLES—THE PAST
Berenice Broom, Town Clerk

The Town Clerk gave a talk to the Probus Club recently and, after a lot of research, ended up with six pages of information all relating to the history of Beccles, past, present and future. I asked if I could cover this in the Charter in installments, so here are the first few paragraphs

"The earliest recorded mention of Beccles was from an account of The Corporation of Beccles Fen which has a translation in the Charter granted to the Town by Queen Elizabeth I in 1584. In this book it states that "The Manor and advowson of Beccles were granted to the monastery of St Edmunds Bury by King Edwy about

the year 960". Beccles derived its name from two parts of its present name—Beck, meaning by the stream, and leas meaning meadow by the stream and was, at that time, a fishing town as the sea came in a large estuary up to Beccles and beyond. The town paid a tithe to the Crown of 30,000 herring per year but, due to land movements and changes in the way the sea came in at Gt Yarmouth, the estuary silted up and eventually the channel was embanked and land was reclaimed from the sea. The dissolution of the monasteries by Henry VIII in the 1500s caused the people of Beccles to panic. It also created an opportunity for the local individuals and groups

contending pasturage on the Common, to fight about those rights, and this remained contentious for many years. The people of Beccles sent a Mr William Rede to London in 1542 to obtain the lordship of the manor for Beccles but many disputes continued over rights to the Common for 40 years or more. It was only when the Charter was granted by Queen Elizabeth I in 1584 that the contentious matters were settled. Although the Redes were then excluded from membership of the Corporation of Beccles Common or Fen until 1711, they retained the lordship of the Manor which included control and profits from the Market.
