

NEW COUNCILLORS FOR DARBY AND RIGBOURNE THROWN IN AT THE DEEP END

ue to the resignation of two long-term Councillors, Jack Walmsley (Rigbourne Ward) and John Sigsworth (Darby Ward), vacancies for cooption were advertised. The two resigning Councillors had served on the Council for ten years contributing much to the community in that time, and will be sorely missed.

Surprisingly for a co-option so late into a four year term, ten worthy candidates applied for these positions. This left the existing Councillors with a difficult choice, but finally after much deliberation they voted for Mr Hugh Taylor for Rigbourne Ward, and Mr David Richardson for Darby Ward both standing for United Beccles.

Two very nervous men entered the Town Council Chambers for their first Council meeting on Tuesday 16th July where they signed a Declaration of Acceptance of Office. Once this was done they then sat at the horseshoe table with their fellow Councillors.

The very next evening the Mayor of Beccles, Councillor Mrs Caroline Topping, held her Mayor's Reception for over one

hundred guests at The Waveney Centre in New Market, supported by the Mayor's Cadet, Warrant Officer Hannah Fryer, and six other Air Cadets who were there to meet and greet and serve refreshments. The two new Councillors rubbed shoulders with officers and representatives from organisations and other Parish and Town Councils.

The Mayor, assisted by Keith Loffstadt auctioned off donations by various businesses and organisations in the town for the Mayoral Appeal for the refurbishment of the 2nd Beccles Scouts Head Quarters. This and the raffle realised £516 and the Mayor was thrilled with this great start. She aims to raise £30,000 for this organisation in her Mayoral year.

All the guests enjoyed the buffet by Mrs Christine Cutts, famous for her cakes and pies at the Indoor Bowls Club.

At the reception there were information display boards promoting smaller sectors of the volunteering community for local organisations (2nd Beccles Scouts, Helping Hands and the Beccles Community Arts.) Also



a new idea from Caroline was to have entertainment and she invited three young people, David, Maizie and Ellie, all competent artists, to sing and play during the evening. The Mayor's son Daniel played the organ (donated by the late Fred Leah's family) and Tom Lock played his accordion. Everyone enjoyed the music very much.

ouncillor Mrs Caroline Topping took on the mantle of Mayor on Tuesday 21st May and hasn't looked back since. She has received many invitations and has already attended over 20 engagements since that time. She takes her role in the town extremely seriously and has already embarked on a new 'networking group' as she noticed that there were more 'lady mayors' in office than usual and decided to invite Mayors, both male and female, as well as

leaders of towns in the Waveney Valley to a networking event. The first meeting was held at Bungay with nine Mayors and Leaders/Chairs from Harleston, Halesworth, Bungay, Diss, Waveney District Council, Loddon, Southwold, with apologies from Eye and South Norfolk District Council. This networking event proved extremely useful, with all gaining insight into their roles and how they brought together different and sometimes diverse actions to stimu-

late both their council and their towns. All agreed that this meeting proved that, with input from other councils, improvements could be made collectively by pooling information and possibly resources.

The Mayor will be arranging a further meeting of the Mayors' and Leaders soon, and it will be interesting to see how this very pro-active lady Mayor uses her enthusiasm to embrace this role in other ways.

ELECTION FOR PLACE ON COMMON WARD

he resignation of Councillor Mrs Sue Bergin came as a surprise soon after the resignations of Jack Walmsley and John Sigsworth. To have an election at least ten residents from the Parish Ward have to request an election. This costs in the region of over £3,000 and has to be paid for by the Town Council. By the time the election is carried out, (Monday 2nd September 2013) the new candidate will have just 18 months left to serve as a Town Councillor, until the next election.

The next Election for a four year term of office will be held in May 2015 when all existing

Councillors will have to battle to keep their seats against new Candidates fighting to take their place.

For future reference, to be nominated as a Councillor you must acquire a nomination form from the Town Clerk at Beccles or the Returning Officer, Town Hall, High Street, Lowestoft NR32 1HS. This form must be returned to the Returning Officer at the above address with the required signatures obtained by the candidate.

If the election is contested for any of the 16 Councillor places in any of the four wards, Centre, Common, Rigbourne and Darby, a poll will take place on the first Thursday in May.

This is an opportunity to serve your town and its people and make a difference in society. If you feel you have the skills, with a lot of common sense, a sense of humor the ability to see both sides of an argument and be a team player, then you would make a great Councillor and ambassador for the town.

SOUTHERN LINK ROAD UPDATE

Where we are:

The Public Exhibition took place in May in the town's Library. The event was well attended and views were noted with further discussions with officers at the Library by those who would be most affected by the scheme. All correspondence had to be received by the end of

July. The Environmental Statement, a key part of the planning application, has been created from the Environmental Impact Assessment and it concludes all the surveys and assessments which have been taking place over the last year and a half. What happens next:

The Planning Application

is due to be submitted at the end of September 2013. This will allow the scheme to go to the Development Control Committee in either December or early 2014. If permission is granted, Suffolk County Council will then look to start discussion with landowners.

FRACKING

Suffolk County Councillor Chris Punt reports that he has been asked information about or seeking to ensure that Fracking doesn't happen in Suffolk.

Suffolk County Council is the Minerals Planning Authority in Suffolk and would deal with any planning applications for unconventional oil and gas exploration or production. However, it is most unlikely that there will be any interest in shale gas exploration in the region as the geology of the County would preclude this.

To date the main interest in shale gas has been in Lancashire, but there has also been interest shown in the Wealden area of Kent and West Sussex, Somerset and South Wales. The following link takes you to a map produced by the British Geological Survey showing areas underlain by shale formations. These formations are not in Suffolk. http:// www.bgs.ac.uk/research/ energy/shaleGas/ howMuch.html

There are no licensed areas in Suffolk.
